

In April, the Manchester office and Discovery Quay teams took part in a Charity Breakfast to raise much needed funds for 'Rory's Wish to Walk'.

Rory is a cerebral palsy warrior who underwent major pelvic reconstruction and double hip surgeries in Boston Children's Hospital, in the hope that one day he'll be able to walk.

A huge thank you goes out to everyone for their contribution to the event and to those who participated and donated so generously.

A total of £236.17 was raised and has been donated to Rory's GoFundMe page.



Some People Say it with Flowers

The delivery of stone was made to 'Dandelion Time' in Maidstone, a charity that works with disadvantaged children and families experiencing serious behavioural and emotional difficulties.

The farm setting at Dandelion Time provides the opportunity for families to experiment, play and connect within its fields, gardens, and woodland.

With therapies including everything from calming crafts to gardening and animal care, families are able to share new experiences and create memories.

Working with National Highways and our supplier Aggregate Industries, we delivered more than 10 tonnes of stone aggregate to help with the base of new woodland toilets and improved pathways to this nature-based charity.

SOCIAL SPOTLIGHT

Gary Redpath

Gary Redpath is a Social Impact Business Partner within our Civil Engineering division and has been at GRAHAM for two years. His latest project, the Clyde Waterfront and Renfrew Riverside (CWRR), is one that's close to his heart. We spoke to Gary to find out more about his role and why he decided to get involved with social impact.



What made you want to get involved in social impact?

I grew up in Clydebank - that's where we are currently building the bridge. I applied straight away when I saw an opportunity to work for GRAHAM and deliver the social values commitments.

In my previous role with an employability service, it was clear to see how social value was becoming increasingly popular within construction, so it was a win-win for me.

It was also a great chance to work on

such an iconic project in the town I grew up in. It's really rewarding going out to schools and communities to teach people about the different roles and how there is a place for everyone in construction.

Why are you so passionate about social impact?

In my previous role, I was used to working with contractors to support their social value deliverables. So, when the job came up in social impact, it was the perfect fit for me. It's a great feeling to know the local community is benefiting from us being there and delivering the project.

The community groups that we support benefit massively. It's not just writing a cheque to someone or

ticking a box, we build relationships that last, and help them long after our project or event is over.

Also, the amount of good people you meet is just inspiring.

What have been the highlights of your career to date?

I think the highlight for me has to be the CWRR project. As I say, I'm born and bred in Clydebank and it's needed attention for a long time, so to be part of that is amazing.

Through this project we've been able to support so many different groups and individuals, especially going to different schools and providing STEM talks. You do get a real sense that your helping the area you grew up.

What projects have you been working on in the last 12 months?

Asides from CWRR, I've been part of some great projects like Leith Outer Berth, Glen Douglas, and South Bank Quay. Both CWRR and South Bank Quay were awarded a perfect Considerate Constructors Scheme (CCS) score and I'm sure Leith is the next contender for top marks.

Working all over the country, you build relationships with lots of different people you'd usually never meet, it's a great perk of the job.

If you have any, what do you enjoy doing in your spare time?



I've got two young kids who take up a lot of my spare time. Lucy is nine and Brody is eleven.

When I'm not working or travelling for work, every weekend is pretty much spent going swimming, boxing, dancing - the list goes on!

Every now and again I do get out to the pub, thankfully we have good social meetings in the CWRR team. The project and contracts managers are really good at making sure everyone gets a bit of downtime and build relationships outside of the work setting.



What did you want to be growing up?

I wanted to be a joiner like my dad, but I quickly realised I didn't have the practical skills at all. I am absolutely useless when it comes to any hands-on activities, but I still wanted to be involved with construction in some way.

The civils side of construction always interested me, working on bridge builds and highways, just massive projects. It's great I'm finally a part of that. My two kids actually think I'm building the bridge in Clydebank by myself.

What's your aspirations for the future of social impact?

GRAHAM is already on the right track when it comes to planning for the future and how to grow social values.

The company is proactive when it comes to social values and finding new ventures, it's not just a copy and paste exercise. We are always out trying to find new innovative ways to deliver social values and the team are great at sharing information with each other to make sure the organisations are getting the full benefits from our projects. The more we do now, the better stead it puts us in for the future.

Life on Site for Vitalii Slobodian

Vitalii Slobodian recently joined GRAHAM after immigrating to Scotland from Ukraine. Here he tells us all about his experience on site and how it's helped him gain new skills and friends.

Can you tell us your name, job title and the project you're currently working on?

My name is Vitalii, I came here from Ukraine.

I work for GRAHAM on the Central Quay site - a landmark construction project for rent in Glasgow, which is now one of the tallest buildings in the city. 498 high-quality apartments will be created in four blocks with a height of 6 to 20 floors. Once completed, it will house more than 1,000 residents and will include a state-of-the-art gym, a landscaped courtyard, two roof terraces, a library and a cinema.

How did you get the job in GRAHAM?

I was offered this job at the Job Centre, but I had no previous experience in the field. I decided to try something new for myself. After the interview with Project Manager, Peter Brady, I felt that he was a reliable person who really knew the business and industry.

What does a typical day on site involve?

To date, I work in buildings. I keep the apartments clean and carry out tasks given to me by my supervisor. The tasks are always different. For example, we protected the windows with a film from the impact of facade works. My supervisor is Chris Moran. In case I need help or I do not know how to do something - I can always contact him.

What has been the biggest challenge?

It is difficult and at the same time interesting to do things that you have never done before. What's important is that work is always done in a safe manner so you don't harm yourself or anyone else.

Sometimes things are not obvious, so I seek advice from my supervisors who have more experience and know the right way to do things.

It's good that you can turn to experienced colleagues for guidance.

What new skills and knowledge have you learnt along the way?

I understand more about how construction works and how to perform new tasks properly.

Having already gained some experience, I can work more skilfully and quickly. Even when working with other people, I am now able to help them.

What have you enjoyed most about working in GRAHAM and what impact has this had on you?

Many people work for GRAHAM, which makes it possible to make new acquaintances.

GRAHAM gives you the opportunity to work depending on your needs. If I find it difficult to do something, I can ask for help or change my task.

Everyone does what they can and if you are interested in a specific job, you can ask if you can learn it.

Suzanne Stevenson

Suzanne Stevenson is a Social Impact Adviser for Building North, who has been working in GRAHAM for over 6 years.

Born and raised in Falkirk, Scotland, Suzanne lives with her husband and recently found a new hobby – despite her previous fear of water!

Here's what she had to say...

What made you want to get involved in social impact?

My background has always been community benefits, mainly working with schools, communities and helping people into work. It's so rewarding because you're getting people into work or helping disadvantaged youths that would never be given some of the opportunities we offer.

I love visiting schools and engaging with young people by showing them different routes into construction they didn't know about. Then getting to see them a year down the line in full-time employment, it's a great feeling.



Why are you so passionate about social impact?

I just love working with the communities and showcasing the advantages our projects can bring.

Seeing children's faces when they get into their new schools or facilities, it's magical.

I've met so many young teens that are so down beaten and think they've no future, because that's all they've been told, so going in and talking to them about their options and getting them into work is so rewarding.

What have been the highlights of your career to date?

We worked on a project over in Meadowbank and got in touch with a local school in the area who told us they were never able to start a football team, because they couldn't afford any kit or equipment. So, we donated a football strip and a training kit to the school.

I remember after we gave them the strips and took a few photos at the site, they insisted on walking back to school in their new kit because they were so excited. That was a really enjoyable project, just to see their faces and that spark in them again.

What projects have you been working on in the last 12 months?

The Baird and Anchor is a pretty high value project with some great work going on.

We were also down at York University which is gathering up all the awards. One of the companies there took on about 60-70 people who were mostly apprentices. I think in total around 118 new jobs were created on that project, so the lasting impact in the area is amazing.



If you have any, what do you enjoy doing in your spare time?

I've recently taken up paddle boarding and kayaking, which came as a huge surprise to most people given my fear of boats and water.

My husband and I were on a trip last year and I saw a couple of people out paddle boarding and I thought to myself, 'I like the look of that!' so I went and got all the kit, bought myself a new board and I haven't looked back since.

I recently bought myself a little camper van and take myself off at the weekend to different spots to kayak and paddle board.

I also knit and crochet baby items for our local hospital for the premature babies.

What did you want to be growing up?

When I was young, I wanted to be a children's nanny. My plan was to become a children's nanny for a couple in Canada and holiday with them all over the world. But when I turned 16, I decided to leave school and get a job.

Never in a million years did I think

I would get into the construction industry; I actually got my law degree after I had my children and worked for a few years in Parliament. After that I kind of fell into construction as a Site Admin and as they say - the rest is history.

What's your aspirations for the future of social impact?

I hope we make a really good lasting impact and a positive legacy long after we are gone - it's not just the buildings we want to leave behind.

Social value has really taken off over the past few years and it's becoming a top priority, so I hope it becomes a driving force for good.
